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Declaration of Landowners & other Inhabitants.

WE, the undersigned, Landowners, Clergy, Yeomen, Traders, and others, Inhabitants of the Isle of Wight, have seen with extreme surprise, Advertisements having reference to a project for establishing Railways in the Island.

We hereby declare our direct and determined hostility to this wild and dangerous speculation, which, so far from benefiting the Island, would painfully affect its interests, and would threaten with ruin a large class of its inhabitants.

Neither the importance of our Trade, nor the extent of our Roads, nor the size of the limited area to which we are confined, lead us to require any facilities of transport other than those which we at present enjoy; nor do we believe that the Visiters, whose occasional residence gives profit and support to numbers, would wish to exchange for the hurried speed of a Railway those ordinary means of conveyance to the quiet enjoyment of which they look for pleasure and for health.

We protest therefore most anxiously and carnestly against a proposal, thrust upon us contrary to our wishes and to our interests, involving serious risk to the Speculators, threatening deep injury to the Inhabitants of the Island, and utterly uscless and valueless to the Community at large.
