## PSHE: Working with others

### Teamwork

Crossover subjects: English, Maths, History, Geography and Drama

## Contextual Summary

This is a fun orienteering and geocaching inspired PSHE activity which involves navigating using GPS and retrieving information from a series of plaques located around Robin Hill. The task is designed to engage students with their visit to the park and enables teachers to focus students on any of several possible curriculum subjects. The task challenges students to practise their precise observation and navigational skills by competing against other teams to find plaques that contain several subject tasks. The information on the plaques is designed to be used in conjunction with an activity sheet,

students have access to GPS equipment (an app on their phone for example).

Teachers must decide whether to focus their students on one subject activity or several - this will depend on the time available and capability of the groups. Different groups could be tasked with undertaking different subject activities, or all of them can complete the same one e.g. History. The plaques can be visited in any order so groups can be dispatched in different directions to minimise waiting time. This is quite a strenuous activity as it incorporates the whole park, which could mean a lot of walking / running. Advise students to carry water and wear appropriate clothing to suit the expected weather conditions. As a PSHE working together task, groups should be coached to share the roles involved in the activity. For example, the GPS unit should be passed around and the roles of scribe or navigator varied. Everyone should be encouraged to contribute. The optimum group size is 4-6, rising to 6-8 for the Drama activity.

## Ability Levels

This resource is suitable for upper key stage 2 students who can work in mixed-ability groups. There are two versions, one mixed-ability variant and one variant for less-able/wheelchair users (resource 105142) - this has fewer plaques to find and is a slightly easier route to navigate without steps or gravel paths.

Teachers may wish to add a competition element to the exercise. For example, a 'best video' award for the Drama task, or a 'most correct answers' award for the History task.

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For the drama task, students could edit their filmed improvisations, and vote on the success of each one. Students could also reflect on the following:

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- ▶ How well they worked together as a team
- ▶ How successful they were in terms of the task

## INSTRUCTIONS FOR TEACHERS

This fun orienteering and geocaching inspired activity involves finding and retrieving information from a series of plaques located around Robin Hill. The information on the plaques is designed to be used in conjunction with an activity sheet (the student resource, in this case 105141), one per group, which are subject themed in English, Maths, History, Geography and Drama.

Teachers should decide whether to focus on one activity or several depending on the time available and aptitude/ability levels of their groups. They could have different groups doing different activities, or all of them doing the same one. The plaques can be visited in any order so groups can be dispatched in different directions to minimise waiting time.

The activity should take between 60 and 90 minutes. If required, there is a special accessible version of this resource which is wheelchair friendly (105142). There are fewer plaques to find, and is an easier course with no steps or gravel paths (but will still require some pushing).

This is quite a strenuous activity taking in the whole park, which could mean a lot of walking / running. Advise students that the activity is not suitable for those with physical disabilities or those who are unable to walk. Users and the less able will need supervision and help – although the accessible resource doesn't take in any steps or gravel paths, there are some steep grassy areas in the park which could be avoided.

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The activity starts at a large distinct old elm tree marking the entrance. Here there is plenty of space for briefings and marshalling groups. We recommend using this as the finish line too, as it is easy to find, especially if you allow your groups to undertake the activity unsupervised. At this tree there is an example plaque similar to those used throughout the park for the activity. Students can be introduced to the plaque and shown how to read it before they set off in search of the real ones.

Each group will need:

- ✓ a GPS unit or smartphone / tablet app (there are many free apps available on all platforms)
- ✓ 1 field compass for each group undertaking the 'Geography' task, marked in degrees
- ✓ 1 video camera or phone for each group undertaking the 'Drama' task with sufficient battery / memory / tape for 30 minutes filming
- ✓ copies of just the sections of the resources which are relevant to their chosen subject activity
- ✓ in case of wet weather we suggest laminating these or printing them onto acetate and using permanent marker pens to complete them
- ✓ at the very least use clear plastic pockets and pencils.

As a PSHE working together task, groups should be coached to share the roles involved in the activity. For example, the GPS unit should be passed around and the roles of scribe or navigator varied. Everyone should be encouraged to contribute.
