## J.B. Priestley

John Boynton Priestley lived on the Island from 1933 to 1959, first at Billingham Manor then at Brook Hill House.

J.B. Priestley was born in Bradford in 1894 and after being educated at Belle Vue Grammar School, he went to work for a wool firm called Helm & Co. It was whilst working here that he started writing at night; he had some of his articles published in newspapers as far away as London and he later moved south.

- ► Explore the use of radio as a major source of communication during Priestley's working life. Consider how, without images, the emphasis was purely on words and sound to convey meaning.

Try to counter any negative comments with positive ones.
