



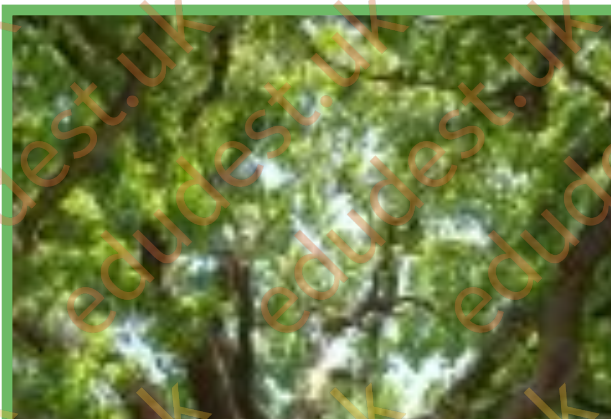
Be Creative!

- ✓ This resource will provide you with ideas for writing creatively in response to your tree-climbing experience with Goodleaf.
- ✓ Choose one of the tasks suggested below, or invent your own! Planning space is provided on page 2.



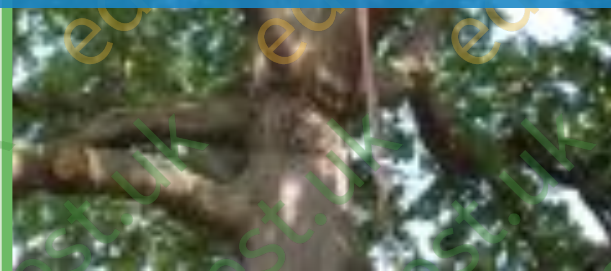
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- » Write a story about an insect, bird or mammal that lives in the oak tree. Describe their actions, thoughts, feelings, surroundings, etc.
- » Reflecting on your own tree-climb, describe your own feelings as you climbed up the tree and then when you descended (came down).
- » Think about the colours and textures of the tree and its parts. Describe them, using as many similes and metaphors as you can, for example: 'juvenile leaves sparkled in the morning dew like polished emeralds'.
- » Imagine and describe experiencing the four seasons as if you are the tree, or just choose one season to focus on! Is it hot or cold? How does wind feel? What do you see? What can you smell?
- » You are the tallest oak tree in Appley Park during a wild and raging winter thunderstorm. Describe your fears/feelings.
- » Craft a poem about the park or oak tree that uses onomatopoeia to describe the sounds you may hear there.
- » Imagine yourself sitting at the top of the tree. Look around you. Describe what you see.
- » You are the tree, living through the ages from sapling to aged beauty. Describe the experience of growing up. What historical or social events might you have seen? Write as if you are the tree personified.
- » Craft a poem on any tree-related topic of choice, using metaphor and simile - it is your choice whether to use rhyme.



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
